

With Late Splurge, 38-7

The Thomas A. Roberts six-man (tackle) football team of Berlin, playing the first home game and the second such contest in the history of the school, scored a highly impressive win over the Heidelberg Dependents High School squad by a one sided count of 38-7. The game was played before a large crowd of students and Community supporters at the Berlin Sports Center last Friday.

The return of Bud Davenport to the TARian line-up proved to be the necessary spark needed by the local boys, as he methodically directed the trickly Cub offense, as they practically scored at will.

In the very first play from scrimmage, Sam Thomson, offensive star of the game, lateraled to Davenport, who romped all the way for the initial goal line crossing. In the second period, Thomson scored one of his three touchdowns on a 25 yard gallop around right end. The half ended with the score favoring Berlin 12-0.

Gracious Host

Heidelberg managed to hold the winners during the third quarter, but in the beginning of the fourth canto, the Cub steamroller really began to operate. Sam Thomson chalked up his second and third T. D.'s in the first few minutes with end runs from far out. Jim "Chief" Bender continued the Berlin avalanche with a neat 40 yard touchdown jaunt after receiving a pitch out from Davenport. In the very last play of the game, Davenport electrified the crowd with a magnificent 45 yard heave to Bender, who scampered the remaining 15 yards for the sixth and final touchdown.

The outclassed visitors scored their only marker late in the fourth quarter on a long kick-off return which was aided by good blocking, something that was lacking most of the afternoon for the zone invaders.

Thomson with three touchdowns and one extra point, proved to be the offensive punch for the Cubs, while Bender scored twice and was a defensive demon, making one victious tackle after another. Other defensive gems on the local team that played a big part in TAR's landslide conquest were Don Gray, John Gilliam and freshman George Shepard. All twelve members of the team saw action, as Coach Alex Kyrios utilized this opportunity to give his boys as much experience as possible.

Pointing Ahead

Coach Kyrios was extremely gratified at the TAR victory and congratulated his boys on their fine play and sportsmanship. However, he warned them of any possible letdown, and pointed out that there were still three hard games remaining on the schedule.

Today, Oct. 20, at 1:30 p.m., the Berlin Cubs will play the Bremerhaven Dependents High School at the Sports Center. Once again, a large crowd of students and local supporters are expected to attend the clash and cheer for the Post lightweights to continue their winning ways.

The smallest Dependents High School in the European Command, Berlin's own Thomas A Roberts High, with only seventeen boys enrolled, has fielded a football team for the first time in the history of the school this year. This midget squad of athletes is throwing a tremendous scare into the much more experienced and larger institutes in the zone.

Placing football on its athletic schedule for the first time this year, the school has more than been rewarded by the splendid effort and sportsmanship shown by the twelve man team. Under the leadership of TAR's Athletic Director, Mr. Alex Kyrios, the hustling gridsters need only to win this weeks game against the strong and pigskin wise Wiesbaden six, to tie for the Command championship.

After getting off to a shaky start by dropping their first contest to Wiesbaden, 26-0, the TARians have bounced back from their initial game jitters to smash Heidelberg and Bremerhayen by lopsided scores of 38-7 and 51-0 respectively. So look to this weekend, as the spirited Cubs will be out for sweet revenge at the expense of the visiting Wiesbadeners.

With the encouraging and enthusiastic support shown on the part of this community, Berlin is going all out to bring home this year's title. This afternoon, this strong supporting element will be out at the Berlin Sports Center in droves for the crown deciding clash of two pint-sized giants, with the kick-off slated for 1:30 p.m.

To review last weeks tiff with Bremerhaven, the winning localites left little to be desired by their all out effort of smooth and machine like precision. Spearheaded by the brilliant halfbacking of Sam Thomson and the cool signal calling of Bud Davenport, the Berliners scored the first three times that they handled the ball. Davenport showed no signs of his hand injury, as his quarterbacking was the main clog in the fast clicking TAR machine. Thomas scored twenty points although he only played one third of the contest, giving way to his understudy early.

Relying mostly on reserves throughout the marathon. Coach Kyrios gave every member of his "bench battalion" a chance at the visitors. His eager scrubs gave no indication of being scrubs, as they continued the hammering in the second half, chalking up thirty-one more points.

Cubs Down Nurnberg 20-6

Thomas A. Roberts High School football team last week won the 1951 EUCOM Interscholastic Conference six man tackle championship by downing a stubborn Nurnberg squad 20-6 on the losers home field.

Undefeated and untied this year, the local aggregation proved that quality is sometimes better than quantity as they completely dominated

the day's play and held the Nurnberg gridders to a meager one touchdown.

Jim Bender was once again the high man for the TARians as he scored two touchdowns and added two extra points. In the closing minutes of the game, the fleet-footed Bender, aided by an excellent block by Bob Partain, raced 80 yards through the entire Nurnberg team for the afternoon's most stellar performance. This marked the tenth time that Bender has crossed the double stripe this year and was a fitting end to his high school football career.

The first half was a nip and tuck battle with both teams making sustained drives, only to be stopped in scoring territory, and the half ended in a scoreless tie.





Cubs Annex 2nd Conference Title

Sporting a record of five wins against no losses, the Thomas A. Roberts High School of Berlin clinched the 1951-52 EUCOM (small school) basketball championship last week by downing Bremerhaven High School 48-26 in a game at Columbia gym.

It was the second title in a row that the local athletes have won, the first being the 1951 EUCOM 6-man tackle football crown last fall when the TARians went through the entire season undefeated.

In the pennant winning game with Bremerhaven, Jim Bender once again led the Cub scoring attack, as the redoubtable Jim came up with a scintillating 33 point effort. He now has a total of 161 point for the season, 112 of which were collected in conference play.

The game started off slowly and at the end of the first canto, Berlin led 6-2. The second quarter however
