EL GRECO—his real name was Domenicos Theotocopoulos, a Cretan painter, (1548-1614) He was Spain's greatest painter, sculptor, and architect of the 16th century. The Trinity in the Prado, Madrid and the other masterpieces of glowing color and religious fervor, created a sensation. His art is best studied in the Greco museum and the churches of Toledo, in the Prado in Madrid, and in the famous palace of Philip II, El Escorial near Madrid.



RAPHAEL SANTI or Sanzio 1483-1520 an Italian painter of the Umbian and Roman Schools. He was the greatest painter of the Italian Renaissance. Raphael was inspired by the masterpieces of Michelangelo, da Vinci, Donatello. The Madonnas of his Florentine period have made him one of the most beloved of all painters. In 1514 Raphael succeeded Bramante as architect of St. Peter's in Rome. He was appointed conservator of the antique monuments and excavations in Rome. A whole school of noted architects, sculptors, painters, wood carvers, mosaicists, and engravers were employed to execute his designs for churches, palaces, and villas. Raphael died suddenly of fever in his 37th year. He is buried in the Pantheon in Rome.

PETER PAUL RUBENS—1577-1640 a Flemish painter the most eminent of the Flemish school. He was appointed court painter by Albrecht and Isabella, regents of the Netherlands. His studio in Antwerp became the training school for students from all over Europe. Rubens enjoyed such great popularity in both England and Spain that he was knighted by the monarchs of both countries. Especially successful as a portraitist, Rubens dominated the artistic taste of Europe for almost a century.



FOOTBALL HISTORY

The season always begins with apprehension and suspense, yet they were uncalled for, as was shown by the Cub's first game of the season. In Bremerhaven our team defeated last year's arch rival. The Cubs returned after routing the Black Hawks 34-0. What a way to open the season!

A home game opened the conference, our reassurance dwindled; Berlin was downed 24 to 20 by Wurzburg after what seemed a certain victory. But after this defeat the Cubs did not look back; they went from victory to victory. Baumholders' Bucs were sent home with a 14-0 defeat. The Bitburg Barons were downed 24 to 20. With a triumph of 14-0 over the Augsburg Apaches, the situation really began to look bright for the young bears. Our Homecoming game against the Manheim Bisons brought a 36-22 victory and a more than successful Homecoming dance.

This victory put the team in a tie for first place in the Silver Division and with a victory in the final game of the season, the team's supremacy and sole leadership as division champions would have been secure. It was, however, not to be; the team met with a humiliating 24-6 defeat—the season came to a close with Berlin tied for first place. The Cubs' winning record was 5-0-2.

How was this admirable record possible with only one returning letterman? Mr. Elstran with his coaching made what seemed to be impossible an undeniable fact. As the coach said, "Coaching is like painting a picture; you start with the basic colors and make them into something." The 1967-68 team was, for the coach, his best team "to come from the least amount of raw material."

Our Cubs were the smallest, youngest, and least experienced team in the conference. In every game the opponents made more first downs and yardage than we did. Besides this, we stopped the other teams from scoring when they got behind our fifteen yard line, 31 out of 41 times.



B.A.H.S. is proud of the coach and the 1967-68 football team. We had many exciting and packed games and a very successful season.














