The school day extends from 0830-1500 hours with 35 minutes for lunch. The European Exchange System operates the hop-lunch program, snack-bar items, and vending machines.

ATTENDANCE

Attendance is required. Notification of absence from school will be sent by card to the father's duty address. This will be done on a daily basis. Notes for absences will not ordinarily be required from parents unless requested by the school. A record of the student's attendance will be kept at the school. This change in procedure is made to insure better communication between parents and the school regarding students' attendance.

For "permission to be absent in advance", continue to use the old system of the student bringing a note from sponsor requesting this 10 days before leaving except in emergency.

DRESS AND GROOMING

Students are expected to dress and groom themselves in good taste. Individual taste is the basic guideline. "Hot Pants" are not acceptable. Students arriving at school in flagrantly distasteful attire will be sent home. The faculty will determine, in individual cases, what is acceptable and what is not acceptable.

DUTY ADDRESS OF FATHER

You must insure that the school has a currently correct duty address for the sponsor. This, of course, is because the school will be sending daily absence reports to this address.

ACTIVITY

The student activity program provides an important adjunct to the curriculum of the school. This program includes such activities as major and minor athletics, student council, instrumental and choral music, student publications, debating, dramatics, and various other interesting activities.

HONOR ROLL

At the end of each marking period an honor roll will be published consisting of those students who have maintained an honor-point average of at least 3.4 in courses meeting five times weekly and having not less than a "C" in every course. An honorable mention roll is also published consisting of those students who have maintained an honor-point average of 3.0 to 3.4.

CLASS LOAD

Students normally are expected to carry six subjects. Many courses not requiring homework are offered and students are encouraged to take such courses rather than study halls.

LUNCH PROGRAM

Two lunch hourse are proveded. The first, generally for junior high students, runs from 1130 to 1205 hours. The second, generally for senior high students, runs from 1230 to 1305 hours. The European Exchange System operates the school cafeteria. A regular hot lunch is available for approximately .55. In addition, a regular snack bar facility exists with sandwiches, hamburgers, french-fried potatos, beverages, etc. The message facility is open from 0800 to 1600 daily.

SMOKING

Smoking cannot be permitted in the school because of a U.S. Dependents Schools, European Area, regulation prohibiting it.

LOCKERS

Hall lockers are provided for the students for their personal belongings. Students are required to purchase combination locks from the school at cost for these lockers. The reason for the cost follows: this item is not funded by the government.

TRAHSPORTATION

Transportation is provided and supervised by the military. Rules governing school behavior are applicable to conduct on school buses.

TRANSFER

When a student transfers to another high school, his student-personnel folder will be forwarded upon request of the receiving school. A report card, which will be given at the time of his clearance, is all that

A student who is transferred within 20 school days prior to the end of a semester, and who notifies the Guidance Office at least one month prior to his transfer, may be given advance additional assignments to cover the work of the month. The student will be given an examination of the material covered. He will receive a mark and credit for the semester in the subject according to the examination, effort, achievement on the advance assignments, and his regular class work. For those with unsatisfactory achievement records, the school will furnish a record of attendance and scholastic grades for the period enrolled.
