

SHOWCASE OF THE WEST


West Berlin is the biggest city in Germany, both in size and population, and is the largest industrial center between Paris and Moscow. Gleaming buildings, thriving industries, and a democratic government make it a showcase of the west.

AN ISLAND CITY

West Berlin lies deep within the German Democratic Republic, a hundred miles from the Federal Republic of Germany. Not a constituent part of West Germany, it remains under the protection of France, Great Britain, and the United States, who honor the four-power agreements that divided Berlin into four sectors.

The fourth sector has become the capital of the GDR and is separated from the rest of the city by a barrier of concrete guard towers, manned by border troops at firing range intervals; vehicle traps, land mines, beds of upturned spikes, barbed wire, viscious dogs, electric fences, flood lights, and trip alarms complete the 'security zone'. Few people dare to attempt crossing the 'antifascist protective barrier', as it is called in the east.

This year's class represented two countries at the Hague and Patrece Cashwell — delegation ambassador for Zimbabwe.





Seven Who Flew for All of Us

"Don't let happen what I think just happened."

Over a period of 25 years, Americans had soared into space 55 times and their safe return had come to be taken for granted. An age when most anyone, given a few months training, could go along for a rate ride seemed imminent. Christa McAuliffe was the pioneer and the symbol of this amazing new era of space for Everyman. A high school teacher from New Hampshire, she was to be the first ordinary ritizen shot into space, charged with showing millions at watchful schoolchildren how wonderful it could be. She was bringing every American who had ever been taught by a "Mrs. McAuliffe" into this new era with her. It was an era that lasted only 73 seconds.

Disbelief turned to horror as the reality became all too clear: McAuliffe and six astronauts had disappeared in an orange-and-white fireball nine miles above the Atlantic Ocean. So too, had the space shuttle Challenger, the trusted \$1.2 billion workhorse on which they had been riding. Transfixed by the terrible sight of the explosion, Americans watched as it was replayed again and again.

The world held its breath during a dizzying procession of terrorist nightmares. Palestinians hijacked TWA flight 847 in June; four PLO men seized an Italian ship in October. In the November hijacking of an Egyptian airliner, 60 were killed. Other disasters were both natural and man-made.

"Three high-intensive grenades were thrown on passengers inside a place like a 737. It was hell." Egyptair pilot Hani Galal, injured by a hijacker on flight 648, as 60 were fatally wounded at the Malta airport.

"The whole world began to scream. I woke up my daughter, and we ran out to one of the streets around the cemetery. We were able to stay out of danger until they rescued us." — Marina Franco de Huez, describing her escape in Columbia, where a volcanic eruption killed over 25,000.

"If hell exists, it would look like Mexico today." — Raul Tirado Serrano, Mexico City cab driver, after the earthquake that killed thousands.

long-simmering South Africa erupted in violence, while a volcano, earthquakes, air crashes and famine killed hundreds-ofthousands more. Yet there were also reasons for hope - an unprecedented gush of charity fund-raising, a charismatic new leader in the Kremlin and a summit meeting that held, if not answers, promise.



"There were two or three strong shocks, and cushions flew around me. One chair was on top of me, and I couldn't move. My stomach felt as if it were being torn apart. Gradually I slept . . . I heard men talking, and it was morning." - Yumi Ochiai, 26-year-old assistant purser, recounting the crash of JAL Flight 123 in which 520 died.

"We will survive. We depend on Allah." - Anamul Haq, whose son and daughter were among 12,000 Bangledeshis killed in a cyclone and tidal wave.

"I cannot explain how we are alive. First the entrance wall fell off, and then the other walls fell off. And then we were sliding down, sandwiched between the floor and the ceiling." - Julio Maldonado, survivor of mud slides that killed more than 125 in Puerto Rico.
