

1           ANNCE:       (COLD)    Hey, gang...it's your Teen Canteen on the Air!

2           MUSIC:        OPENING THEME IN FULL, THEN TO KEY FOR

3           ANNCE:        Yes, gang...this is your Teen Canteen on the Air...fifteen

4                    minutes in which to give you the run-down of what the

5                    teen-agers in Berlin are doing and thinking this week.

6                    But you grown-ups are invited to join us too.  You'll

7                    hear the top tune of the week, as chosen by the students

8                    at TAR High School...our special guest of the week...and

9                    a few surprises.  Yes, all this, plus a lot more is yours

10                   now, as the Teen Canteen is on the Air!

11          MUSIC:        UP FULL, THEN TO OUT UNDER

12          ANN:         Like the man said, we're back again with your Teen Canteen.

13                    This is Ann Worrell, introducing the other members of our

14                    board of experts.

15          NANCY:       Yes, we are.

16          ANN:         You are...what?

17          NANCY:       Bored of experts.

18          ANN:         Ooohhh...  Anyway, that was Nancy Leone.

19          SKIPPY:      What about me, huh -- huh -- what a bout me, huh?

20          ANN:         I was just getting to that.  This is Skippy Babbitt, our

21                    other...our other....

22          SKIP:        Why, thank you, Ann.  I couldn't have done it better myself.

23          NANCY:       Hey, what's on the agenda this week, Ann?

24          ANN:         Lots.

25          NANCY:       Oh, goody!  We're going into the real estate business!

26          ANN:         What gives you that idea?

1 NANCY: Well, you said, "lots"...and lots are the things they  
2 buy and sell in the real estate business, so naturally....  
3 ANN: (INTERRUPTING) Naturally.  
4 SKIP: Who's our guest for this week, Ann?  
5 ANN: Well, we had a gal on last week, and she did a real terrific  
6 job.  
7 NANCY: That was Barbara Garnett.  
8 ANN: Yeh...and this week, since it would be nice to have a man...  
9 NANCY: (INTERRUPTING) You can say that again!  
10 ANN: (IGNORING HER) ...on the show, I invited Barb's brother  
11 over.  
12 SKIP: Bill Garnett? Say, that's swell? But where is he?  
13 BILL: Right over here, Ann. (FADING ON) Hi, girls...what's  
14 new this week?  
15 NANCY: Everything! Boy!. Have you seen those super movies...  
16 the ones about people from other planets? Boy, oh boy!  
17 Are they ever weird!  
18 ANN: Oh, brother...wouldn't it be funny if we could go to the  
19 planets these people come from?  
20 BILL: Don't laugh...it might happen!  
21 SKIP: Are you for real?  
22 BILL: Sure. Look...they're making plans now to send rockets  
23 to the moon. The Pentagon has put out an order for the  
24 scientists to devise a practical atom-powered motor. Why,  
25 by the year two thousand, things like flying to the moon  
26 will be an everyday occurrence.

1           ANN:           Now I knew you're kidding'.

2           BILL:           No...I'm serious. Why, I bet we could even put on a little

3                           skit telling about it.

4           SKIP:           Gee, that would be fun!

5           BILL:           Well, look...Ann...you go ahead with the show, and put a

6                           few notes together about what life will be like in the year

7                           two thousand.

8           ANN:           Swell, Bill. Right now, kids, we'd like to take time out

9                           for the top tune of the week. We went all around TAR and

10                          you all seemed to agree on this one. Here it is now...

11                          your favorite song A Kiss For Yarnation by

12                          Francis Lane.

13           MUSIC:        TOP TUNE

14           ANN:           Are you ready, Bill?

15           BILL:           You bet I am, Ann.

16           ANN:           Swell. Now, suppose you tell us about it before we start.

17           BILL:           Okay. Well, in the year two thousand, things like cars

18                          with gasoline meters will be obsolete. You'd think nothing

19                          of taking a week-end hep to the moon. (FADING OFF) Why,

20                          I can see it now. You get into your own private rocket

21                          ship and take off.....

22           SOUND:        JET PLANE IN DIVE. IN FULL, THEN OUT FOR

23           SOUND:        JET PLANE IN FLIGHT. THRU TO BG FOR

24           SKIP:           Now, Bill! Slow down!

25           BILL:           Aaaaa...

26           SKIP:           Look out for those meteors! You're going too fast!

1 BILL: All right. You back seat drivers are all the same.  
2 Yak. Yak. Yak...that's all you do. I'll be glad when  
3 we finally get to the moon.  
4 SKIP: Sadie said that their week-end cottage there is simply  
5 perfect.  
6 BILL: I'll bet. Probably doesn't even have revolving escalators.  
7 SKIP: That's not a nice thing to say. Why, she and Sam spent  
8 hundreds of diamonds fixing this place up. Oh, I'll admit  
9 it doesn't have atomic heating...but what can you expect?  
10 We have to have some place to rough it!  
11 BILL: The last place they built didn't even have a radiation  
12 shower. We had to wash with -- ugh -- water!  
13 SKIP: Oh, heaven forbid. Well, come on, Bill...let's get there!  
14 MUSIC: SHORT BRIDGE IN FULL, THEN TO OUT UNDER  
15 NANCY: Well, I'm glad you finally get here. We've been expecting  
16 you for hours.  
17 SKIP: Well, you knew how these things are.  
18 NANCY: Yes. Why, only last week, Sam and I were on our way to  
19 Pluto. He has a branch office there, you know. Well,  
20 anyway, we ran out of fuel half-way there, and had to stop  
21 at the oldest refueling station on Saturn. Why, they  
22 didn't have anything there. We had to pay seventeen diamonds  
23 a molecule for atoms. Why, that's four diamonds more than  
24 Venus is charging. It's awful!  
25 BILL: Golly, I'll never go there anymore. The prices on Jupiter  
26 are going up, too.

1           SKIP:        Let me tell you, Sadie...last week, Bill and I were  
2                            there. We thought we could save a few diamonds by  
3                            shopping out in the country like that, and we were really  
4                            surprised!

5           NANCY:        How so?

6           SKIP:        Well, you know that cute little purple spacesuit that  
7                            I saw two weeks ago on Pluto?

8           NANCY:        Yes...

9           SKIP:        Well, I saw one just like it on Jupiter, and it was twenty  
10                           diamonds higher?

11          NANCY:        Are you sure it was the same?

12          SKIP:        Of course I'm sure! Why, it had the same metallic content.  
13                           Twenty per cent sheet steel, and five per cent beryllium.

14          NANCY:        Well, we're lucky we're able to buy anything at all like  
15                           that.

16          SKIP:        How do you mean?

17          NANCY:        Well, I saw an old magazine in the museum the other day.  
18                           It was printed in 1951...and the styles were positively  
19                           hideous!

20          SKIP:        You don't mean...

21          NANCY:        Yes! One of the women was wearing what they called ---  
22                           er -- a dress!

23          SKIP:        What on earth is a dress?

24          BILL:        You remember, honey...the things the gals used to wear  
25                           fifty years ago...those old sacks made out of the hair  
26                           of animals. They used to weave them, then warp 'em around

1 BILL: (CONT'D) themselves for protection against the cold.

2 SKIP: Oh, yes. I have some pictures at home of my grandmother

3 wearing some old things like that. I'd almost forgotten.

4 NANCY: Can you imagine what it would be like, wearing something

5 like that now?

6 SKIP: I hate the thought of it. Why, how could they fly to

7 any other planet with bare legs hanging out? Why, outer

8 space particles would psitively scorch their legs.

9 BILL: Say, Sadie...are you still wearing those same old legs?

10 NANCY: Why, of course not! I gave them to the last rummage sale

11 the bone bank had!

12 BILL: I thought so. I was at a party on earth the other night,

13 and I could swear those were your legs that Gertie Fincastle

14 had on.

15 SKIP: Bill! That's not a nice thing to say about anyone! You

16 know how much trouble Sadie had with her legs before she

17 traded them in on the new models!

18 BILL: Well, it's her own fault. With medical science the way

19 it is today, we have the choice of any member of the body

20 we want. If we're not satisfied with the one we have,

21 then we just go to the community surgeon and get fitted

22 for new ones. Ours even has a special order department!

23 NANCY: Imagine what it was like in 1951! Those poor fools --

1           BILL:       From what my grandmother told me...they made time in  
2                       their cars!

3           NANCY:       Just never you midn, young man!

4           SKIP:       Well, Sadie...where's Sam? I haven't seen him around?

5           NANCY:       Well, he went over to Saturn on business this week-end.  
6                       I expect him back tomorrow night. He says that he wants  
7                       to look at a new~~sp~~ space ship over there. It just came out.  
8                       It's a new X-9-K Q-4...equipped with mstoor space searchers.  
9                       They give you radar contact on a televised screen, so that  
10                      youwon't run into any meteors or flying particles. The  
11                      range is pretty good, from what I hear...something like a  
12                      thousand miles.

13          BILL:       Is that all? I thought you said it was good!

14          NANCY:       Well, the inside of it makes up for anything it's lacking  
15                      in equipment. All of the rooms have electric eye doors  
16                      and mechanical parts. It has an automatic cumbustion  
17                      chamber that's supposed to make for easier landings. It's
