MUNICH — Berlin won two of the last four relay races to edge SHAPE for the European Forces Swim League championship Sunday.

Led by Aryn Ballard and Troy Johnson, who each won five events and brokerecords, Berlin amassed 1,334 points to SHAPE's 1,308½.

Kaiserslautern followed with 1,064, Patch 779 and Munich 567 as 320 swimmers from 15 teams competed in the Munich Olympic pool.
