## Juniors Take Merit Test Soon

who plan to graduate from high school and enter college in the fall of 1967 are eligible to the Twelfth Annual National Merit qualifying tests for U.S. Army dependent high school students. These tests will be administered at all high schools in

the European Area on March 1st.
Forty Army Merit Scholarships
and forty individual loans are available to qualifying dependents of Army personnel under an agree-ment between the Department of the Army and the National Merit Corporation, administors of the program.

Beginning with the award of the U.S. Army Merit Scholarships in the spring of 1966, the minimum scholarship stipend will be increased from \$250 to \$500 a year. Two New York.

Students who are juniors now and Berlin seniors are eligible for this scholarship: Lynn Horner and Frank Harris. As a result of the high scores they earned on this test last year they are finalists in the annual com-petition. The results of their Scholastic Aptitude Tests, taken in December, will determine whether they actually receive one of these scholar-

ships. Each merit scholarship is a fouryear award to cover the under-graduate college years. Finalists select the college they wish to attend and the course of study they plan to pursue.



## How To "Beat Your Man" On A Wrestling Mat!

mechanics and terminology.

The beginning of each "meet" starts with a "match between the lowest or 95 lbs. weight class and it progresses to include all the other eleven classes, the highest of which is for those wrestlers over 180 lbs. Each individual match lasts for

2 minute periods unless one of the participants is "pinned". A pin is scored when one of the wrestlers puts his opponent flat on his back for a full second.

At the beginning of a match, two

When a wrestler gains control of his man he has a number of ways in which he can "break his man down". To break his man down, a wrestler must get his opponent in a prone position where he can then use one the various pinning combinations to pin his man.

Most of the time during a match is spent in the down position. One wrestler tries to break the other down, his opponent tries to escape. Like any other sport, wrestling is much more enjoyable to observe when you understand its basic tions. When the whistle signifying the beginning of the match is blown, the wrestlers try to "take their man down" or gain control of him.

American High School Wrestling team will display some of these in the upcoming home matches. Scoring a wrestling match is done

on an individual basis for each match. The team score is based on a cummulative basis. Points are assigned on the following basis: Take downs: 1 point

Reserval: 1 point Near pin for 1 sec: 1 point Near pin for 3 sec: 3 points

If a wrestler wins his match by decision or by outscoring his man he gets 3 points for the team; a wrestler pinning his man boosts the score up by 5 points; a tie gives each team 2 points.

Who says there isn't anything to do in Berlin?! Now that winter is firmly entrenched, one can iceskate all morning, ski in the afternoon, and then go sledding at the Rodelbahn in the evening.

One can even skate in the rain at Neukoelln or the Europa Center. Neukoelln (near the Leinestrasse U-Bahn) is open from eight to eleven in the morning, two to five in the afternoon, and from seven to eleven at night. It costs thirty or fifty Pfennigs to get in and skates rent for two marks an hour with a deposit of forty marks or an identi-fication card. The Europa Center is open from 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m., from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m., and from 8 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. Admission costs one of two marks, and skates rent for two marks an hour.

possibly only skiing hill in Berlin. It has a ski lift which costs one mark per ride- and skis and poles can be rented.

## Wrestling Round The World

The art of wrestling is almost as old as man himself. Records of ancient matches have been found in Babylonia, dating as early as 3000 B.C., and carved on the walls in the pyramids of Egypt. It wasn't until the Greeks introduced wrestling into the XVIII Olympiad, in 704 B.C. however, that the sport gained popularity in the civilized world.

The Romans in their later Olympiads under Nero were responsible for the development of what we now call Greco-Roman Wrestling. The emphasis in the method is on standing holds and the wrestlers are not allowed to seize each other anywhere below the waist.

As early as 22 B.C. the Japanese had their famous Sumo wrestlers. These huge Asian, men, weighing over 300 lbs., were responsible for the development of the other form

of wrestling called Catch-As-Catch-Can. This method, used in America, is somewhat freer than Greco-Roman Wrestling in that prone holds are emphasized. Only choking and kick-ing are forbidden. Both forms of wrestling are now used in the modern Olympic Games.

Almost every race of people in the world developed their own wrest-ling style. The American Indians had leg wrestling and even the American backwoodsmen had their own lawless style. Wrestling turned professional in

America in the 1880's with William Muldoon as the first world champ-ion. Since then eight classes have developed by weight: Flyweight—
121 lbs and under; bantamweight—
128 lbs; featherweight—136 lbs; lightweight—145 lbs; welterweight—
155 lbs; Middleweight—165 lbs; lightheavyweight—175 lbs; heavyweight -unlimited.

Wrestling is at present an organized, entertaining, professional and school sport.
