
T-shirts for Sale! We have some Berlin Brats t-shirts left from our recent Regional in Melbourne, Florida. The t-shirts are maroon with white letter-



The BAHS Influence... by John Freeman, class of '71

Whenever I'm shooting baskets in the driveway (it's my thinking time), I occasionally reflect on how crucial high school was in steering me toward my profession. Twenty-seven years ago, who would've thought taking photos for the BAHS yearbook and newspaper would lead to my job as an associate professor of photojournalism at the University of Florida?

My inspiration and support came from many people, but right after my parents, I'd have to credit Mrs. Judy Belt. She taught me (and others) more than typing or bookkeeping. Mrs. Belt got me involved at the *Berlin Observer* through her cooperative work-experience program.

I remember moaning about having to work six hours a week to get three units of credit. My dad said, "Why don't you wait and see how it goes before complaining?" Of course, once I was at the Observer, I couldn't stay away. I covered AYA football games, the Volksfest, change of command ceremonies, and concerts. My father loaned me his camera for a Jimi Hendrix concert, and I got a published photo I'm still proud of today.

Other Berliners had an influence before the Observer. Classmate Ken Cousins invited me over one snowy day during a Christmas break (1969?) and showed me the magic of developing pictures. His father had a home darkroom and probably worked as a spy for the Army. Bear Facts editor Steve Reisler and his irrelevant brand of humor added greatly to my understanding of the power of the press. I don't know if anyone else appreciated our sarcastic and sardonic wit, but geez, it was fun to write.

I remember being yearbook editor briefly, and wanting to sell advertising and change the format, but I was quickly fired after suggesting Mrs. Pietsch was too traditional an adviser. My editorial to Bear Facts didn't make it past the "censor" (Mr. Locher?), so I protested by not having my picture in the yearbook that year (1971). Replacement editor Toni Yarlborough did let me write the farewell.

I enjoyed having access to a darkroom in a closet on the top floor of BAHS and cranked out a ton of 8" x 10" prints from football games for 50 cents a piece. Later on, the Army hobby labs at McNair and Andrew Barracks became my home away from home. I eventually set up a darkroom in our apartment at 10 Taylorstrasse, using smelly but cheap chemicals bought in the East. A highlight of my final summer in Berlin was working full-time at the Observer.

After four years at the University of Missouri School of Journalism and internships

at newspapers in Phoenix and West Palm Beach, I settled into six years at the newspaper in Wichita, KS., where I met my wife, had two kids, got a master's degree and bought a house. But teaching had always been an interest, too, so I quit the paper and spent 10 years teaching photography at Wichita State University. I remember first thinking about teaching in Miss Beam's history class. The ability to inspire and perhaps influence someone's life was fascinating.

I returned to Berlin in 1982 as part of a honeymoon trip and was surprised at some of the changes 11 years after my

> graduation. The open-air Europa Center downtown no longer had an ice skating rink or those ice cream stands shaped like Igloos. The Center had been en-

closed with a trendy multi-level restaurant. KaDaWe was still a magnificent store, and luckily you could still buy a Curry-wurst at the Wittenberg Platz U-Bahn station. The Berlin Brigade commissary and PX were all new. On the day we arrived, the Volksfest was in full swing behind the AYA and that brought back many pleasant memories.

Like many of you, I get nostalgic thinking about the high school years we proudly spent in Berlin. I gush about the city a lot. But I credit my BAHS experience for providing the nucleus for my professional life, and I have no regrets tying the past to the present. In 1995,

I spent eight weeks at National Geographic in Washington, D. C. Accomplishments like those were just dreams when I stood on the sidelines at Berlin football games shooting photos. That little darkroom on the top floor of BAHS served its purpose well.

It Won't Be German!

Here it is – the latest news from Europe!

The News Standard has received this bulletin fresh from our Brussels based News Service....

The European Union commissioners have announced that agreement has been reached to adopt English as the preferred language for European communications, rather than German, which was the other possibility. As part of the negotiations, Her Majesty's Government conceded that English spelling had some room for improvement and has accepted a five-year phased plan for what will be known as EuroEnglish (Euro for short). In the first year, "s" will be used instead of the soft "c". Sertainly, sivil servants will resieve this news with joy. Also, the hard "c" will be replaced with "k". Not only will this klear up konfusion, but typewriters kan have one less letter. There will be growing publik enthusiasm in the sekond year, when the troublesome "ph" will be replaced by "f". This will make words like "fotograf" 20 per sent shorter. In the third year, publik akseptanse of the new spelling kan be expekted to reach the stage where more komplikated changes are possible. Governments will enkourage the removal of double letters, which have always ben a deterent to akurate speling.
